In compliance with instructions contained in the above letter, I sent 10 men with the two couriers back to Fort Dodge on the morning of September 5th this left me twenty five 25 men in the saddle.

From Fort Dodge I marched to Dodge City when I crossed the bridge over the Arkansas River and then Marched S.W. towards Crooked Creek Crossing the headbreaks of Mulberry Creek about halfway. I struck Crooked Creek at a point 9 miles above its bend to the south. I then marched up the creek 6 miles and after that down it for 44 miles where a running stream, the Man Arroya empties into Crooked Creek from the West side leaving the transportation and part of the command in camp I went up this stream and found it to be a lively rivulet, of fresh clear water from to six feet wide and winding through a level valley from  $\frac{1}{2}$  to  $\frac{3}{4}$  miles wide covered with a dense growth of good grass. At a distance of 4 miles from its mouth the stream forks, I marched up and along the northern fork and found it to be a running stream for about 2 miles. When it forms a small marsh at the foot of a wide dry sandy run, terminating in rough breaks, running for out into the prairie, From the head of the running water of the north fork I crossed over a narrow ridge to the south fork and marched along on down it and returned to Camp. The South fork has the same character as the north fork, from the mouth of Man Arroya, I marched down
