The stick, of which plate LXXXVI gives a good idea, is of maple, a little more than 12 inches in length,  $2\frac{3}{8}$  inches in its greatest width, and three-eighths of an inch thick. It is said to have been painted a bright red on one side and a vivid green on the other. The paint has now disappeared, however, leaving bare
