LeGare was sincere and Sitting Bull had enough native shrewdness so that he would have guessed it if LeGare had been fooling him. He also knew that LeGare expected to be paid. The chief might even had thought that he would have to surrender some time and wanted LeGare to get the credit, or pay, if any.
