My uncle lives near Mobridge, South Dakota. He lives in the country. I have not been out there for some years so I cannot give you the detailed direction, but any of the banks in the town would be able to tell you where to locate him. He has a small farm on the edge of Mobridge and he might be living on it, although he does not live there regularly.

I am sure that you will find an interview with him of much interest and anything he tells you can be relied upon, as he is very reliable in his statements. In fact, it used to be quite disappointing that he did not embellish the pioneer events with more color. When your work is in its final form, I would be interested in purchasing a copy of it.

My brother who lived on the Indian Reservation for a period of time says that the cabin in which Sitting Bull lived at the time of his death was near the village of Bullhead and that a few years ago one of Sitting Bull's relatives by the name of One Bull was still living at that point. I am writing my uncle and telling him that you will be through there and telling him also to check up and see how many there are still around who could give you first-hand information.
