

Extract from letter from James McLaughlin, U.S. Indian Agent,
dated Standing Rock, December 19th, 1890, to Hon. T.J. Morgan,
Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D.C. - -

" * * * * * I regret to have to report that 1st
Lieutenant Henry Tatankapah (Bull Head of the Indian Police,
who was reported dangerously wounded in the engagement on the
Grand River on the morning of the 15th inst, died last evening
at 4 P.M. at the Agency hospital from the effects of his wounds,
making a total of 6 Indian police who lost their lives in the fight."

Also, extract from report, dated December 16th, 1890, same party
and addresse as above - (report of 7 copybook pages)

" * * * * * Charles Kashlah (Shave Head 1st Sergeant,
mortally wounded, since dead.

* * * * *

* * * * *

Hawk Man - - - - - killed. "

Note - So Afraid of Bear (or Bull Head); Shave Head and
Courier Hawk Man, all of whom I have written you, were killed.
Red Tomahawk, another man I have spoken about to you, still lives.
He is the Policeman who made the great ride the night of the 14-15
and gathered the police together and carried the letters you have
seen.
