R. Hertz, Eagle Butte S. D. - He is living amongst the remaining followers of Sitting Bull. And he has told me that Judge Charles Corn, now of Eagle Butte S. D. is still living, and he I think took part in the Gen. Custer affair. - I consider as far as history is concerned, that we have a just right to believe both sides of the story, as given by the whites & blacks.
