My friend, Prof. M. G. Smith, of the Department of Anthropology of this University, informs me that you are about to publish a volume regarding the celebrated Dakota warrior, Crazy Horse. As it happens, I am engaged upon a life of Sitting Bull, who was - as you know - a close associate of Crazy Horse. If you have any unpublished data on Crazy Horse which might assist me in my study of Sitting Bull, I shall be very happy if you will let me see it. Of course I will give full credit when my book appears for anything you may help me do.

Of course, my own researches have been chiefly among the Hunkpapa Sioux, and I have little to offer regarding Crazy Horse in return for your kindness. If, however, I succeed in learning anything, I shall be glad to let you know. The only thing contrary to the records is the statement of a certain Sioux to me to the effect that Crazy Horse was wounded, and did not consider himself bullet-proof, as claimed. Possibly at one time he did, though.

I was extremely sorry that it was impossible for me to be in Oklahoma City when you were there recently. I wanted to meet you. Needless to say, I greatly admire your work.
