Dear Stanley Vestal:

I have your letter of June 29th soliciting maps of certain battlefields. We have only the general maps ordinarily found in the reports and publications dealing with the engagements. A few years ago we secured a map of the Big Horn and Yellowstone Expedition of 1876 by General Charles King on which General W. C. Brown added the battlefields of the Indian Wars. The map was based on the Reynolds-Maynadier map of 1859-60. The map was put out by the Clason Map Company, 1515 Tremont Place, Denver, Colorado. You no doubt have used Hebard and Brininstool's The Bozeman Trail, DeLand's The Sioux Wars, published as Volume XV of the South Dakota Historical Collections, Joseph Mills Hanson's The Conquest of the Missouri, and Record of Engagements with Hostile Indians within the Military Division of the Missouri from 1868 to 1882, published at Washington in 1882. Doane Robinson in an article on The Education of Red Cloud in Volume XII of the South Dakota Historical Collections goes somewhat into detail regarding the Wagon Box Fight. For pictures of the monument on the Fort Phil Kearney site I suggest that you write to T. J. Gatchell, Buffalo, Wyoming. He is a life member of the South Dakota Historical Society and is very good about supplying material to fellow fans.

In 1926 I visited the supposed site of the Reynolds-Crazy Horse Celebration of St. Patrick's Day in 1876. The site is a short distance northeast of Moorhead, Montana. Moorhead consists of one store so if you go into that isolated region it would be well to carry your bedding with you. You can no doubt get crackers, cheese and beer at the store. The land on which the fight may have been fought is located as the NW $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. 32, Twn. 8, Range 48 East, Montana Meridian. It is owned by Mr. F. T. Kelsey, Moorhead. He is a fine fellow and I am sure he will be willing to supply pictures of the fight. There was no marker when I was there and I doubt if one has been erected. It is a difficult place to reach and traffic is light. I know this would not interest you and it really shouldn't be included here, but Mr. Kelsey has a very charming daughter and her discovery made even Mr. DeLand sit up

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
