

My dear Mr. Campbell:

I have your letter of January 23d. I asked where you received information that would indicate that Fitzpatrick spoken in the broken illiterate way in which Jim Bridger did. Somehow I had set him up as a gentlemanly fur trader, who because of his contact with the white people and officers in their treaty had a definite knowledge of English. His vernacular rather threw down the idol that I had made him in regard to his contact with the West.

About Sitting Bull, I think if you write to Mr. E.A. Brininstool and be sure that you very clearly make him understand what your economic or money proposition might be before you enter into any contract, he may be of some assistance to you. His address is Box 1072, Station C., Los Angeles, California. He has helped me a very great deal, but you have to be sure of your contract and your bargain before you finish it, because Mr. Brininstool is in rather hard straits financially. I shall keep in mind, however, the part of Sitting Bull, about whom I did not specialize in information. I think if you could write to Mr. L.H. North, 2918 15th St., Columbus, Nebraska, for a small emuneration he would give a tremendous amount of information on Sitting Bull, because Major North and his brother were at the head of the Pawnee Indians from 1865 and on during the period when Sitting Bull was so troublesome. If you feel I can help you in any other way, I will be very glad to try to so do.
