It would seem that five feet, 10 inches was the mold of the Custer family, all except Emanuel Custer the father of the General. The General himself was 5' 10" and weighed between 160 and 165 pounds.

Colonel Brice C. W. Custer, Colonel Charles Calhoun Custer, and Colonel Brice C. W. Custer's two sons 1st Lieuts. George Armstrong Custer III and William Ward Custer are all 5' 10" and weigh between 165 and 175 pounds.

Colonels Brice C. W. Custer and Charles Calhoun Custer are the sons of James Custer (still living in Monroe, Michigan), who was Nevin Custer's son.
