My dear Mr. Campbell:

I take pleasure in stating, in reply to your letter of inquiry of the 7th instant, that the Nez Perce Indian Yellow-Wolf who was with Chief Joseph in the march before the latter's defeat is a resident of this community and from whom the information desired by you can be secured if there is anything at all that would be of interest to you in making your study of the Sioux leader, Sitting Bull.

Harry Owhi, a son of Owhi who was with Chief Joseph as a young man, is usually the interpreter for the Nez Perce here when they have business to transact, and I am sure he would be glad to cooperate with you to secure what is available. I too shall be glad to assist and if you have a line of questioning to be presented for Yellow-Wolf's consideration either Harry Owhi, or I with the latter's help, will be glad to see Yellow-Wolf and record what he has to state.
