The climax of the evening's program came when LELAND D. CASE, stating that Sgt. Charles A. Windolph, one of the heroes of the Custer battle, is still living, at the age of 94, in Dead, S.D., suggested that he be made an honorary member. The suggestion was adopted unanimously and thus Sergeant Windolph, one of the 24 troopers of the Seventh who were awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for heroism at the Battle of the Little Big Horn, became the first National Honorary Member of WESTERNERS.

BURLEIGH WITHERS volunteered to prepare an appropriate scroll to be presented to Sergeant Windolph and this has been done. It reads as follows:

"We salute you, Sergeant Charles A. Windolph, and bring you word that the WESTERNERS, meeting in Chicago, Ill. on the 25th day of September, 1944, have unanimously elected you an Honorary Life Member in admiration of and appreciation for your service in the Winning of the West as a member of the Seventh Cavalry, United States Army, and for your valor at the Battle of the Little Big Horn, June 25-26, 1876. In testimony whereof we present you with this scroll, signed on behalf of the members of WESTERNERS, by the Posse -- Elmo Scott Watson, Leland D. Case, Franklin J. Meine and Herbert A. Kellar."
