A very striking change in public sentiment on the Indian question has shown itself in the utterances of the public press during the Dakota troubles. There has been manifest a far greater willingness to look on both sides of the question, to consider fairly the grievances of the Indians, and to accept a reasonable explanation of the causes of the disturbance. The Association has done a large and important work in supplying newspapers with the information which it has received from reliable correspondents in Dakota, both as to the facts of the situation and as to the conclusions which might reasonably be drawn from them. In this way our utterances have gone through all parts of the country to many thousand readers, and have materially affected the public view of the situation. We desire to express our sense of appreciation to the press ar large for their valuable co-operation.
