

July 22, 1884, that portion of the reservation north of the Missouri River, about 24,503 acres, was relinquished by the War Department to the Interior Department.

October 1, 1890, by an act of Congress (26 Stat., 646) the balance of the reservation lying east and north of the Missouri was directed to be opened to settlers.

X October 31, 1892, the post of Fort Randall was turned over to the Quartermaster's Department.

November 9, 1892, Fort Randall was discontinued as a military post, - Special Order No. 102, Department of Dakota.

December 7, 1892, troops were withdrawn from Fort Randall, - a detachment of the 21st Infantry consisting of officers and 43 enlisted men.

October 20, 1893, in pursuance of the act of July 5, 1884 (23 Stat., 103) the remainder of the reservation was relinquished by the War Department to the Interior Department.

Fort Randall was the station proper of troops that served in connection with several Indian campaigns, notably the campaigns of 1855-1856, 1862-1863, 1865-1866 and 1876-1877.
