Just what clothing did he have on when you first saw the body? Was he buried in that? Did the hair appear to have been clipped? Some say that it was taken for watch chains. Did you see any ornaments, charms, or anything of the sort on his person?

When did the soldiers drive in the coffin nails? Where? Was this an official act- under orders- or did they do it on their own initiative? Did any of the Indian police take part in this? How many soldiers turned out, would you say, for this nail-driving?
