had been done by members of Big Bear"s band while the Cree chief was earnestly protesting against bloodshed of any kind his anxiety was evidentiy relieved. Te hed entertained a good opinion of Big Bear, but wen he had heard thet he had been a party to the murder of unoffending white people, and particulerly of two priesta, he had been renderod very unhappy. Before the rebellion broke out and before Riel had gone horth he had been GOLTCITD WO LESS TUAT PIVE TTMES
to join the Halforead agitatow in this rising against canadian authority in the forthwest. He had informed the oficers on his reservation that he had no intention of taking part ia any aisturbance, having no desire to fight the white people on either side of the line. At the mention of Crowfoot* nane Sitting Bull smiles, mile his coustennce lit up with that peculair pleusing expression ghich told umaistakeable that the neme of an old friend had been mentioned, and he immediataly pronounced the name of the grent Bow River Chief in Blackfoot -- Bapponexico, Te then explained to the interpreter that that was the Blackfoot name for Cromfoot, and again pronounced Cpowfoot's nane in his own language. Te then volunteered the information that Crowfoot was a very great man and controlled a great many warriors. Fe was fiftymeight years old and had been A WARE TRIBND OF SITTTNG BULL

So friendly were they indeed that he (Sitting Eull) had named one of his sons after Crowfoot. That son was never at home on the reserve. Thile talking of Crowfoot, Sitting Bull again referred to poundnaker, alluding to the relationship and friendship between Poundmaker cnd Crowfoot, and it soomed rather difficult for him to wacrstand if poundraker hed actwally been in rebellion against the Government that Crosfootwould have remained 1oyal. If Crowfoot was to be influenced in joinine any rising poundmaker would have been the men who could heve induced hin to do so. Brom talking about the affairs of the Canadian Indians, the old Chief reverted to that of his own poople. He said that he had
