## THE CHIEFS ARRIVE

Sitting Bull, Gall and other Sioux arrive in St. Paul.

At 8: 40 this morning the party of Sioux chiefs from the Standing Rock agency, who are en route to Washington, D. C., on matters connected with the treaty for opening the reservation, arrived in St. Paul over the Milwaukee road. The party is under the charge of Agent McLaughlin and Interpreter Louis Primeaux, and it will be joined by parties from four other agencies, increasing the delegation to sixty-four chiefs in all. The party which arrived this morning includes Sitting Bull, Gall, John Grass, Mad Bear, Big Head, Two Bears, Thunder Hawk, Bear's Rib, High Eagle, High Bear, Gray Eagle, Fire Heart, Walking Eagle and Hairy Chin.

They were quartered at the Sherman house, and were there seen in the room by a Dispatch reporter.

Doughty old Sitting Bull sat upon the bed with an angelic smile overspreading his remarkable face. That is the smile would have been angelic had it been seen on the face of anyone else, but old Bull is not spiritual in the least. He has the homliest kind of a mug, although it is a powerful face. It is broader than it is long, with massive cheek bones, a powerful chin, a flattened nose, and small, sparkling eyes that have a cruel glitter in them. He sat upon the bed this morning puffing a long pipe, between expressive grunts. He rested his elaborately beaded moccasins upon the floor and seemed. contented and happy. Bull has become somewhat civilized. He wears store clothes and parts his long, heavy, coarse hair in the middle, tying the plaited ends with a bit of calico. Fifty-six years, mostly devoted to devilment, have passed over the wily old sioux, and he
