No. 3 - S. B. pursues a Crow mounted Indian and strikes him with his lance.

S. B. rides red horse without bridle and with feathers in his tail and poll. The Crow has a gun and a blue horse, and shield black and blue, and gun.

No. 3. The design on the Crow shield probably also refers to the four regions. S. B.'s hair seems to be arranged in a distinct pompadour. There seem to be two guards on S. B.'s lance, one at the end and the other at the base of the point, of somewhat different structure than those I have observed. Those I have seen were disks of thick feather stubs at the grip to make the latter firmer (to prevent the lance being wrenched out of the hand of the warrior). In this case the lower one seems to have that function and the upper one to keep the point from entering the body of the enemy farther than the point where metal point and wooden shaft are joined.
