they made THE frontier, and the forrtier made America. It may be claimed without fear of contrdiction that they have had a greater share in making the American character what it is that any other minority now living within our borders.

other minorities have been faithfully represented and fairly understood but the Indian has been more persistently misrepresented and misunderstood than any other group, not expecting the negro (who had the advantage of taxing living in cloze contact with large numbers of observant and intelligent white men- an advantage the old-time Indian never knew)

of all the Indians, the Plains Indians were the finest types physically and mentally, with characters which— in many instances— no man of humane sympathies can fail to admire and respect. Of the Indians of the plains, all competent authorities agree that the Dakota or Teton Sioux were the most admirable, with the possible expection of the Cheyennes, their friends and allies. And of these Plains Indians and these Sioux, no man has been so celebrated as Sitting Bull.

It is the purpose of this book to study his character, which is one of great interest- not only for its powerful influence upon American history, for the wealth of materials existing for study, and to the unparalleled influence of the man himself, but because in him we have a full lentith speciment of the primitive intellectual struggling to govern and maintain a savage culture in the face of overwhelming odds.

Such a study is not only something not heretofore attempted in American biography, but an addition to American history, and an effort useful in itself. and an act of justice to a much abused man and a misunderstood people.

In this instance, thr problem was not an exercise in debunking, nor a belated white-washing, but a wholly fresh alignment and re-valuation of the materials, as it were from the beginning.
