They were talking about what happened where Custer fell. They never mentioned anything happened south. These places that are marked clear down to the river they even told what Indians were down there and where One Bull came in and where he saw his uncle. He says that he never knew that SB was in the fight until he was in the fighting crowd and was just coming back, turning around with another man when someone called him from behind and it was SB. SB was rescuing someone who was wounded. He took him out to the camp and returned. He said, "No, SB did not do any of the fighting or shooting. He was taking care of the wounded." All they mentioned was what happened on this spot where I was standing. SB crossed the river from the west side of the river. He mentioned one name that I remember among those that SB rescued - Good Bear who was the son of another Indian who was the camp crier in SB's band. Good Bear Boy was Lone Man's brother. He didn't get a clear understanding between the two divisions of Reno and Custer. He never mentioned anything about what was done with Reno's forces. What I know was with Custer. When we were talking about this these men were all sitting there. One Bull would get rather excited over it. Old Bull would say, "You are talking too much. You are saying more than you ought to." This was when One Bull would say, "I don't know how many I killed." White Bull wasn't in the fight. In connection with talks I have had with One Bull, a good many ~~expressions~~ have express their doubts. The others are more inclined to be reserved. Old Bull and Gray Eagle, when I talk to them separately say, "Our custom whenever we give a narrative of something serious we like to come together as witnesses."
