I would like to know when and where these things happened. Sitting Bull was a great warrior, he fought nearly all the time to hold the land Tetons owned. No one ever knew John Grass to defend his country. He was a Blackfoot and was always on the Missouri receiving rations. Gall was the one of the soldiers of Sitting Bull's commend a "White Crow" band he never distinguished himself only at Ft. Berthold when he was attacked and wounded by soldiers when he was in the Custer battle but did not commend Sitting Bull was the war leader at that time he had the sacred war bonnet a talisman.

It would help to get stories of the same kind about John Grass. If we can show that he made medicine and cured the sick or any other things like that, then we can correct these stories. I want true stories, and when and where they happened.

And as the war leaders had the medicine mans charm. The supposed power really belonged to the medicine man. It was as the he blessed an article and it was carried by those who went to war. Sitting Bull had one at one time. A talisman. Any one could have one of these made if he could pay enough to the medicine man. Any article can be blessed by the medicine man. Sitting Bull had his war bonnet blessed but he himself was not a medicine man. He was a warrior he hever professed to be a medicine man, never held a spirit lodge. Call was a government made chief. He was not
