Dear Campbell:

My answer to your recent letters was much delayed by a mild attack of the flu which was, however, severe enough to weaken me greatly and make me unfit for any kind of work.

I have tried to answer your various questions rather informally on the margins of the respective letters.

There is no hurry about the books and I hope you will enjoy them, especially the grammar.

If possible, try to get complete Sioux texts. The best man to do that kind of work is my old interpreter Herbert Bisonette. His father was a St. Charles, Mo. Frenchman (from my old home town and birthplace) who married a Sioux squaw. You also mention a Bisonette in your Kit Carson. I wonder whether it was the same man?
