Another long report to Commissioner Morgan, dated Jan 23 1891 contains more regarding authority under which he acted., and a translation of the order in Sioux (which you have seen in my possession - Welch). This letter contains six pages.

Another four page letter, dated Dec 30, 1891, regarding disposition of body of Sitting Bull - with military endorsements, etc, etc.

This in answer to a report by National Indian Defense Association, that the body had been sold to a Bismarck man for \$1,000.00.

In this, H.M.Deeble, A A Surgeon U.S.A., Post Surgeon, says - 3rd End.

"I received the body of Sitting Bull about 4.30 P.M. on the 16th of December 1890 and it was in my custody until it was buried on the 17th. During that time it was not mutilated or disfigured in any manner. I saw the body sewed up in canvas put in a coffin and the lid scrwed down and aferwards buried in the n.w. corner of the post cemetery in a grave about 8 feet deep; in the presence of Capt. A.R.Chapin, Asst. Surgeon U.S.A., Lieut P.G.Nood 12th Infantry, Post Quartermaster and myself."
