After this I ment out from the tent and looked at the people soreaming, dancing, and wildiy waving their arms in the air. One man whom I know well fell upon the ground affecting that he was unconsoious. I ment up to hirn and aaid, "Louis, get up, you are not unconsolous, you are not 111 ; get up and polp me to send these people home." Louls rose and looked about hime All the people san hijn obey mend of course lost their faith in the dance. Lany of them turned to go hore tho some still stayed. I think we mot at least a mile of wagons flled with Indians returning to their homes. At least many of then we convinced that it was useless to dance and that what iitting Bull had told them was fulse. Bhy were sent from the dance and others returned before entering it at sil. This was the last occasion I had to aee the people betore the awful tragedy ocourred whioh erded sitting Bull's life. I think I was the last white person whon they sa beforc that time. Colonel MoLaughlin and others were there shortly before but not at so late a date and when so many hundreds of pople were gethered toge ther when the dance was at its height.

If Sitting bull had been left to himself, wito out interference of the white people, in this dance prooeedings with what knowledge he had of the Bible it is not certain just what would have happened. He tried many times to compromise with me in so far that I wou a agree to teech lis people, for wilch he would be very tharixful, and that I dust induee them to go to the dances as they had always done. These two things could not be done tho for the people whom we had canverted believed that there would be a resurrection day and that the Christ would oome sometime but that it would be in the future while sitting Bull, with his winning pers:nality and gradous preaence was not to be resisted with his theory that the Christ had come for the Indians now and that they alone would rise. He made them belleve, so far as he could, that the whites never would be resurrected and that if the Indiens were brot to life that of neoessity the animals would have to be also for without them they oould not live for theme rould not be aufficient food for them and all their ancestors. He told them that they would soon see their fricnds and there would be olenty to eat for eveqyone and that all the Indians would hereaftic live in etemal joy, and that they would go baok tothoir ont way of
