Now I will write a few lines to you this evening, so willing to send to the list of these words which I will in Indian language.

I hope you will be very and willing to study and learn of these words in Indian if you can, I'm pretty you will learn them in a little while. This is all I'll write to you for this time.

I didn't intend to write a long letter to you but I will some time soon I can.

Now I must explain about this list of words how you should pronounce these in different ways. Now if a word is marked with a little mark or a half circle I'll you should pronounce them in short or quick tones, and with a ^{word} mark is marked at the top you should pronounce them in long sound, if you do the way I say you get the idea alright and read them well!

I have two words that are spelled just exceptly the same, I'll just put them down here so you'll understand them.

These are the words they are sitting and standing, sitting in Indian is The-āw-gōō-tō and standing is The-āw-gōō-tē (over)
