

Listings and descriptions of the spaces for the National Gallery Building at Washington, D. C. for the American Indian.

These dimensions are more for the definition of exhibition space and must not be taken too literally. The architectural problem will be to break up these spaces and to avoid monotony.

Permanent exhibition hall to contain Indian Crafts examples.  
Dimensions 40 ft. x 150 ft. x 20 ft.  
The high ceiling to allow for murals painted by Indian artists.

Permanent exhibition hall to contain Indian Art.  
Dimensions 40 ft. x 150 ft. x 20 ft.  
The high ceiling to allow for murals painted by Indian artists.

Exhibition hall for passing shows of Indian Arts and Crafts.  
Dimensions - 40 ft. x 150 ft. x 20 ft.  
The high ceiling to allow for murals painted by Indian artists.

An auditorium for the showing of sound and motion films of Indian songs, dances, languages, drama, signs and signals with interior designed after S. W. adobe construction.  
Space laid out to include adequate equipment and stage for Indian drama and dances "in person."  
Seating capacity - 600.  
Murals in this auditorium of Indian life.

A vaulted pantheon with sky and landscapes and Indian life running down into made surroundings of natural and actual size including Navajo hogans - tepees - pueblo buildings and cliff dwellings.

PERMANENT EXHIBITION SPACE FOR SCULPTURE AND BAS-RELIEF OF THE INDIANS BY AMERICAN SCULPTORS.  
The high ceiling of these halls to allow for murals of Indian life by American artists.

A PERMANENT EXHIBITION HALL FOR PAINTINGS, DRAWINGS, ETCHINGS, PASTELS, ETC., OF INDIAN LIFE BY AMERICAN ARTISTS.  
Dimensions are 40 ft. x 150 ft. x 20 ft.  
High ceilings to allow for murals of Indian life by American artists.

A library to serve as a reference place for historical and scientific data - folkways and other literature of Indian life.  
Emphasis laid on encouragement and acquirement of literary work by the Indians themselves.  
Dimensions 22 ft. x 44 ft. x 18 ft.  
This room to have a fireplace.

Space allowed for various offices of those in charge of the building.

Full basement for storage, work rooms, and living quarters for Indians employed including those visiting or on business in Washington.  
A place also for parking space for cars.
