- 1 be had within or in the vicinity of the reservation or Indian
- 2 community where the offense was committed.
- 3 Sec. 10. In both civil and criminal causes, the right
- 4 to trial by jury and all other procedural rights guaranteed
- 5 by the Constitution of the United States shall be recognized
- 6 and observed.
- 7 Sec. 11. In criminal cases the rules of evidence shall
- 8 be those prevailing in criminal cases in the United States
- 9 district courts. In civil cases the common law rules of
- 10 evidence, including the rules governing competency of
- 11 witnesses, shall prevail: Provided, however, That the court
- 12 shall have the power to amend such rules by rule of court
- 13 or judicial decision to make them conform as nearly as
- 14 possible to modern changes evidenced by the statutes and
- 15 decisions of the United States and the several States, and
- 16 to adapt them, where necessary, to the solution of problems
- 17 of proof peculiar to the cases before the court.
- 18 Sec. 12. The statutes and decisions of the several
- 19 States, except where the Constitution, treaties, or statutes of
- 20 the United States, or the charters or ordinances of Indian
- 21 communities or orders of executive departments thereunder
- 22 promulgated, otherwise require or provide, shall be regarded
- 23 as rules of decision in all civil cases in the Court of Indian
- 24 Affairs.
