Thanks for your letter of the 13th. I am enclosing a copy of my reply to Mr. Rosebush. The military men and propagandists for the army will never admit how badly they were outclassed by the Plains Indians.

It is one of the rules of respect among Indians that you never ask a leading question, and that you must deal with leading men of integrity and veracity. Suppose a perfect stranger walked up to President Eisenhower and demanded point-blank his collaboration of what, in the opinion of the interrogator, happened at the Battle of the Bulge. What sort of answer would he get?
