5 The next sufferer was Jackson Leatherman half a mile west of Bayless, Leatherman has gone to Eastern Kansas. He lost no live stock except some chickens. The house was completely cleaned out. Kions could not tell me much about Leathermans losses, he says he was in very moderate circumstances and had barely sufficient clothing and bedding for self, wife and 8 children, there were 500 lbs. flour and 40 -50 lbs. bacon also a sewing machine in the house, to Kion knowledge. My opinion is that the loss could not have been less than 2.50 dollars.

6 At this place John Young from Jasper County Iowa was wounded, he was taken by a companion to Shoemakers on Prairie Dog Creek where he died and was buried at Shibolet, P.O.

7 The next place raided was George Kions half a mile below, he lost

8 Thomas Smith from Massachusets staying with Kions lost a valase with all this value unknown and 80 dollars in money. He has gone East to look for work.

This comprises all the damage done on the North fork of the Sohomon, all of which was done Sept. 30, 1878.

The next place the Indians struck was on Prairie Dog Creek, Shibolet,
