This moment back. Received your despatch at St. Louis and those of October fifth (5) here. Am ready to respond to any call you may make, but leave your untrammeled in the management of the complications now in the Sioux Country. The people in the Black Hills and on the yellowstone should be cautioned to collect the horses and families for self-protection. and the troops go straight for the Indianswherever they may be. If they settle at their new Reservations, you had better let them about, but if they go outside their legetimate reservations, there is no alternative but to regard them hostile. If you apprehend serious consequences South by reason of the absence of troops in pursuit of the Cheyennes, I can order the Eighteenth (18) Infantry from Atlanta to the Agencey on the Canadian, Fort Meno.
