Sir:

While Capt. Hemphill Company was here, Mr. Amos Chapman, the Interpreter at Camp Supply informed me that he was at the Cheyenne Agency not long before the escape of the Northern Cheyennes. He says that at that time the Indians at the Agency were suffering for the want of sufficient food. That he knows this both from his own observation and from what was told him by the Indians, and that they were driven to eat horse flesh, taken from horses that had died from disease or natural causes. His opinion is that the escape of these Indians was for the purpose of reaching some place where they could get sufficient food to subsist themselves and families. In his opinion there will be a larger outbreak by the coming Spring, unless something is done to improve their condition at the Agency.

I thought it right to communicate this to you, although you may have full information in regard to these Indians.
