retreat to wood camp, but were entirely unsuccessful, as the Indians had completely surrounded them. It was impossible for the men in camp to render any assistance, owing to the suddenness of the attack and with the dispatch with which the Indians acted. I may add that Felch and Young were shot with arrows and bullets as well axima as mutiliated with the tomahawk. The report of the outrage did not reach the Post until the 12th instant. The Indians who perpetrated it were not recognized and moving south in the direction of Mulberry Creek.
