

CHEROKEE TRIBAL FUNDS PUBLISHED BY HASTINGS

TAHLEQUAH, Okla., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—W. W. Hastings, Cherokee national attorney, in a letter from Washington, enclosed the following statement of the Cherokee tribal funds to date

ARKANSAS LAW STILL GOOD.

Wilson, Okla., Jan. 27.—(Special.)—Contracts made under the Arkansas laws that were in force in old Indian Territory prior to statehood are still governed by these, was the holding of District Judge Russell at Ardmore in a suit for possession of land. The Arkansas laws hold that peaceful occupation of land for seven years gives possession, whereas the Oklahoma laws require fifteen years.

The suit for possession in this case was not started for nine years and is held to be a too tardy procedure. The decision is considered highly important by attorneys in that it will keep down many old claims.

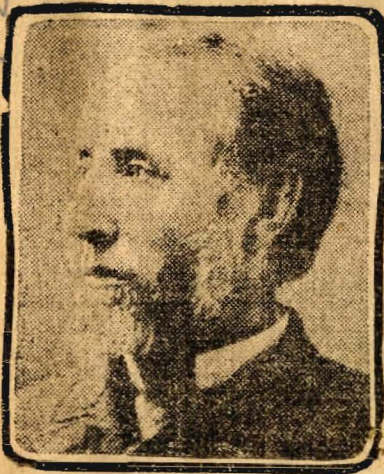
WHITE MAN'S WAY BEATS THE INDIAN WAY COURT HOLDS

District Judge deGraffenried decided yesterday that a marriage performed after the customs of a "white man" has more standing in court than the old Cherokee ceremony, and as a result Peter Washington will receive the estate of his deceased wife Lizzie, amounting to about \$20,000.

Lem Hildebrand, another Indian, claimed that he "just took" Lizzie in 1888 and that Washington, who married her in 1904, "stole her from him."

Attorney W. P. Z. German represented Washington.
