MINORS' PENSION CASES SOON TO BE DISPOSED OF.

SPECIAL DISPATCH TO THE GLOBE-DEMOCRAT.
 WASHINGTON, August 1.—Merrill W. Miller, assistant secretary of the interior, said this morning that not more than fifty cases are involved in the recent ruling of the secretary of the interior that the adjudication of certain minors' claims be resumed. These cases involve minors who, having reached the age of 16, failed to file their applications for back pension before 1880. Commissioner Evans secured an order in 1900 stopping the adjudication of the claims, and since then the matter has been a subject of controversy. When Mr. Ware went into office he disagreed with Mr. Evans, and after a careful review of the cases decided that they should be adjudicated and the pensions allowed according to the decisions. In this he was in thorough accord with Mr. Miller. Judge Thomas Ryan, acting secretary of the interior, promptly signed the new order, and the cases will now be disposed of.
