Superintendent of Dwight Indian Mission school who took charge of the institution last summer. He has served as principal and superintendent in public school work; as an instructor in college and normal schools; as teacher in government schools among the Chippewa Indians, and in mission boarding school work among the Sioux Indians over a period of eighteen years. He is a graduate of Jamestown college which is the Presbyterian college of North Dakota, and for a number of years was one of the trustees of that institution.

Capt. James M. Daniel — C. A. 2nd Regt - L. H. Co.

His true name was JH O'N O'I, when the Civil war broke out he was among the first Cherokee Leader to escape & join Spottleywhala on Bird Creek, Comanche Dist, winter of 1861-2 — was then called in Cherokee O'N A Co — O'N O'Nah-moo-gau tar —

He, it was, who was arst leader of the old Ku-ter-whah (Klan) —

Capt M Daniel had all his time reside in Comanche Dist Cherokee Nation — When the Civil war ended over
