

### TRIBAL UNIONS ARE HELD VALID

Oklahoma City, June 1.—A marriage between the Creek Indian nation contracted according to usage and tribal custom and recognized by the tribal government shall be sustained and held regular in the courts of Oklahoma and children of such marriages shall be deemed legitimate the state supreme court held today in affirming a verdict from the superior court of Oklahoma county.

The court ruling was in a case brought by Mrs. George M. Davis against J. M. Reeder. The suit was to recover some land, the plaintiff alleging the Creek allottee was not the offspring of a legitimate marriage.

The land involved in the suit was part of an allotment of a Creek Indian, who died in infancy, his parents inheriting the land. The sale of the land by the parents to the defendant resulted in the suit.

**Coolidge Among the Youthful.**

Mr. Coolidge is one of the youngest of the Presidents. Born July 4, 1872, he was 51 years and 1 month old when he was sworn in by his father, John Calvin Coolidge, at the old family home at Plymouth, Vt. Those who reached the chief executive office younger were Polk, 49 years old; Fillmore, 50; Pierce, 45; Grant, 46; Garfield, 49; Arthur, 50; Cleveland, 47; and Roosevelt, 42. Three of these—Fillmore, Arthur and Roosevelt—came into the White House, like Coolidge, from the vice-presidency by reason of the President's death. Of the six who thus succeeded to the highest post—Tyler, Fillmore, Johnson, Arthur, Roosevelt and Coolidge—only Roosevelt and Coolidge afterward won their party's nomination to succeed themselves.
