DEATH SUMMONS
HENRY C. MEIGS,
TRIBAL LEADER

Fort Gibson Man, 83 Years
Old, Was Patriarch of
Masons in State

Henry Clay Meigs, 83 years old, pioneer resident of Eastern Oklahoma and believed to be the oldest Mason in the state in point of membership, died at his home in Fort Gibson, 11 o'clock Sunday morning. Funeral services were held at Fort Gibson at 2 o'clock this afternoon and burial was in Fort Gibson cemetery.

Mr. Meigs had lived virtually all his life in and near Fort Gibson. He was a member of the Cherokee tribe and prior to statehood had held almost all positions of trust and honor in the tribe. He was a grandson of Chief John Ross, who was chief of the tribe forty years.

Of Noted Lineage

Mr. Meigs also was a great-grandson of Col. Jonathan Meigs, who was a member of General George Washington's staff during the Revolutionary war.

While he was a factor in tribal politics for years, Mr. Meigs spent most of his time in the mercantile business. He had served in the Confederate army during the Civil war. For several years he was postmaster at Fort Gibson.

Surviving him are three daughters, Mrs. Maude Hill, 521 North Eleventh, Muskogee; Mrs. J. R. Blake of Fort Gibson and Mrs. Frank Doughter of Washington, D. C. and two sons, one of whom, James, lives at Fort Gibson.

PASS OLD VETERANS'
NEW PENSION BILL

Washington, April 1. - An "adjusted pension bill" designed to remove inequities between grantees now paid veterans of the Civil and past wars, was passed today by the senate. Introduced by Senator Bursum, republican, New Mexico, the bill was described by him as substantially the same as that which President Harding vetoed last session. The pension bureau estimated it would cost an additional \$55,000,000 the first year.
