

HIGH TRIBUNAL DIVIDES COURT DISTRICT HERE

Sanborn Assigns Williams to Muskogee Division—
Tulsa Kennamer's

A division of work of Federal Judges Robert L. Williams and Franklin E. Kennamer has been arbitrarily made by Judge Walter H. Sanborn of St. Paul, senior United States circuit Judge of the Elgin district following a long misunderstanding on the part of the two jurists as to their work.

Judge Williams is to preside in the new arbitrary First district, which takes in Tulsa, McAlester and Hugo and has Muskogee as its headquarters. Judge Kennamer will make Tulsa headquarters of the Second district, which includes Ardmore, Chickasha and Ada.

The New Districts

The First district includes the counties of Nowata, Craig, Ottawa, Mayes, Delaware, Wagoner, Cherokee, Adair, Okmulgee, Muskogee, Sequoyah, McIntosh, Haskell, Pittsburg, Hughes, Latimer, LeFlore, Atoka, Choctaw, Pushmataha and McCurtain.

The Second district includes the counties of Washington, Rogers, Creek, Tulsa, Osage, Seminole, Pontotoc, Coal, Johnston, Garvin, Murray, Love, Marshall, Bryan, McClain, Grady, Stephens and Jefferson.
