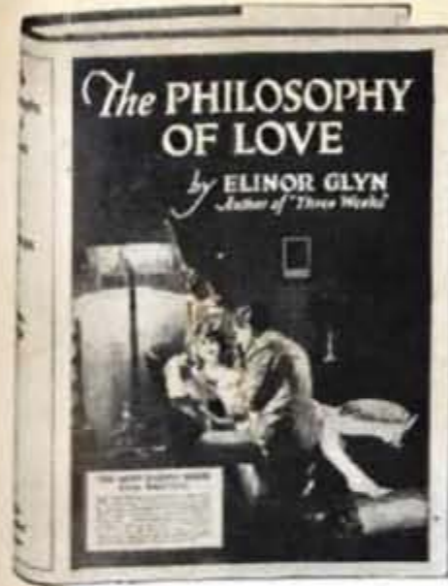

The body of George B. Foreman, 49 years old, of Gore, Okla., who died at a local hospital Wednesday morning at 7:30 o'clock, will be taken to Gore for burial.  
Mr. Foreman, who was a member of the Shrine at Bedouin Temple, Muskogee, and of the W. O. W., is survived by a wife, two daughters, Misses Ruth and Cherry Foreman of Gore; three sons, Haskell, Harry and G. B. Foreman, of Gore, his mother, Mrs. Nannie Foreman, of Vian, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. R. B. Carlyle, of Gore, Mrs. Allen Scott, of Vian, and one brother, Alex Foreman, of Billian.

**HIGH TRIBUNAL  
DIVIDES COURT  
DISTRICT HERE**

Sanborn Assigns Williams  
to Muskogee Division—  
—Tulsa Kennamer's

A division of work of Federal Judges Robert L. Williams and Franklin E. Kennamer has been arbitrarily made by Judge Walter H. Sanborn of St. Paul, senior United States circuit Judge of the Eighth district following a long misunderstanding on the part of the two jurists as to their work.  
Judge Williams is to preside in the new arbitrary first district, which takes in Vinita, McAlester and Hugo and has Muskogee as its headquarters. Judge Kennamer will make Tulsa headquarters of the second district, which includes Ardmore, Chickasha and Ada.

**The New Districts**  
The first district includes the counties of Nowata, Craig, Ottawa, Mayes, Delaware, Wagoner, Cherokee, Adair, Okmulgee, Muskogee, Sequoyah, McIntosh, Haskell, Pittsburg, Hughes, Lott, LeFlore, Atoka, Choctaw, Pushmataha and McCurtain.  
The second district includes the counties of Washington, Rogers, Creek, Tulsa, Okfuskee, Seminole, Pontotoc, Coal, Johnston, Garvin, Murray, Love, Marshall, Bryan, McClain, Grant, Stephens and Jefferson.
