

TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Soldier's Certificate of

Honorable Discharge.



Know ye, that this is to certify That *Hunter Dry*
of Captain James H. Bruce's Company (C), 2^d Regiment of Indian
Home Guard Volunteers, who was enrolled on the 28th day of August, one
thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, to serve three years, or during the war, was Honorably
Discharged *from the military service of the United States on the 31st day of May,*
1865, at Fort Gibson, C. M., by reason of muster out of company

This **CERTIFICATE** is given under the **Act of Congress**, approved March 3, 1873, upon satisfactory proof that the soldier "has lost his Certificate of Discharge," or that it has been "destroyed without his privity or procurement." The same act of Congress provides that it "shall not be accepted as a voucher for the payment of any claim against the United States for pay, bounty, or other allowance, or as evidence in any other case."
