your Community an exemplary  
citizen - yourself a devoted husband  
and myself a valued friend.

Know that in his sober serious  
thoughts of eternity he left you  
such a message in my behalf.  
I appreciate his confidence, and  
when you need my assistance  
you have but to command me  
I am here as one of the Commis-  
sioners of the Choctaw Nation to  
meet like Commissioners from the  
Chickasaw Nation to try and arrange  
a plan for the settlement of their  
differences about their mutual in-  
terests, and will return in a few  
days to the Capital when I  
shall take pleasure in comply-  
ing with your request about the
