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EDITORIAL ON HULPUTTA MICCO ET AL

Hulputta Micco, chief of the Seminoles, accompanied by Isaac Jones and Parjuck Harjochee, Seminole leaders, and Mrs. A. B. Davis, interpreter, and sister of ex-Chief John F. Brown, have gone to Mexico to examine the country preliminary to the migration of a number of Seminoles, who say that white men are encroaching too closely upon them in Indian Territory. Of Parjuck Harjochee's father, Cowakkochee, the story is told that years ago he was accused of showing too much attention to the wife of another Seminole, for which the penalty was that the offender should have his ears split and his nose cut off. Cowakkochee disappeared, and by mistake, an innocent man, found at Cowakkochee's home, was mutilated. The latter took a peculiar view of his wrongs, holding Cowakkochee responsible, and started on his trail. Cowakkochee heard of his danger and fled with his

family and slaves to Mexico. He never returned to the Seminole country.
