A New Book on Management

DURING the past year the Society has had in preparation a book which will appear in Harper and Brothers spring list with the title "Scientific Management in American Industry." It is a book of multiple authorship, the twenty-eight chapters having been prepared by twenty-two contributors under the editorial supervision of Dr. Person. The organization of the book is as follows: Section I, Introduction (origin, development and nature of Scientific Management), three chapters; Section II, Management Research (in various departments), five chapters; Section III, Management Standards (in various departments), nine chapters; Section IV, Control 1—The Control of Operations (in various departments), six chapters; Section V, Control 2—The Maintenance of Standards (through various inspection procedures), four chapters; Section VI, Industrial Relations. Translation into one European language is already under way and translation into other languages is being arranged.
