remarks to them, but she did not physically attack them or continually berate them after they were seated. This was a blatant act of disparate treatment in front of my classmates. Unbeknownst of the extent of undue I felt dehumanized. Curcio and Dr. Sullivan, influence by Professor I contemplated initiating a memo from "Students" to Dr. Holder, Dean of Allied Health, regarding Professor Curcios's behavior that day. Aside from being openly hostile to me when I was not even late, she was rude in her comments to classmates who arrived after we did. Some of my classmates agreed to initial a memo from "Students", but I chose to drop this idea because I feared Professor Curio's retaliation would only result in undue influence adversely affecting my classmates by means of the record-keeping system of the Radiologic Technology Department. I did not want them to go through what I was Professor Curcio later apologized to my classmates for her behavior that day, but she never apologized for her physical attack, hostile tone, or for embarrassing me in front of my peers. This, again, was an act of disparate treatment.

May 4, 1992 - Memo from Professor Curcio about Enrollment Holds Professor Curcio starts her memo by stating "As of March 30,
1992, the University records show an enrollment hold...Reasons
vary from owing lab fees to returned checks." She goes on to
reprimand me about not staying in good standing and I am
threatened by the statement that I "will not be able to enroll
