VIEWS OF J. F. BROWN

Ex-Governor John Brown, of the Seminole nation, gave expression to an enlightened and sound policy when he said that the end of tribal government is at hand and the Indian must prepare for the inevitable. "We want," he said, "good white men to come in and buy the Indian's land at a fair and reasonable compensation and become the neighbor of the red man. We want him to buy 120 acres of land, put it under a high state of cultivation and by his example and co-operation teach his Indian neighbors to farm and improve his adjoining homestead." This is the view held by the great Indian leader and Christian gentleman. If the element of selfishness can be eliminated from the Indian leadership and a practical application of Governor Brown's wise policy can prevail both races will be benefitted and the best fruits of modern day civilization may soon be
