

An Act abolishing certain voting precincts in the Choctaw Nation and stating those to remain.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the General Council of the Choctaw Nation, assembled, That in First District, Sans Bois county the precinct known as Siloam precinct likewise the one known as Oklahoma precinct are hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall only be held at Okchanak Chito precinct, Iron Bridge precinct and little Sans Bois precinct.

Sec. 2. Be it further enacted, That in Skullyville county elections shall only be held at Oak Lodge precinct, Brazil precinct and Cache precinct.

Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, That in Sugar Loaf county the precinct heretofore known as Spring Hill is hereby abolished. And hereafter elections shall only be held at Long Creek precinct, Caston precinct and Black Fork precinct to be changed and called Conser precinct.

Sec. 4. Be it further enacted, That in Caines county the precinct known as Boiling Spring is hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall only be held at Hartshorne, Hiddle and Leflore precincts.

Sec. 5. Be it further enacted, That in Tobucksy county the precincts known as Savannah, High Hill and Double Spring are hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall only be held at McAlester, South Canadian and Calvin precincts.

Sec. 6. Be it further enacted, That in the Second District, in Wade county the precinct known as Tushkahoma is hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall only be held at Pleasant Hill, Albion and High Hill precincts.

Sec. 7. Be it further enacted, That in Nashoba county the precincts known as Mount Zion and Half-way are hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall only be held at Taylor, Battiest and Alikchi precincts.

Sec. 8. Be it further enacted, That in Cedar county Black Jack precinct is hereby abolished. And that elections shall be held only at Davenport, Lick and Sulphur Spring precincts.

Sec. 9. Be it further enacted, That in Boktuklo county, Towahli precinct is hereby abolished. And that elections shall be held only at Lukfatah and Luksukla precincts.

Sec. 10. Be it further enacted, That in Eagle county elections shall be held only at Okachukma, Eohannon and Hocha precincts.

Sec. 11. Be it further enacted. That in Red river county the precincts known as Goodwater and Okalona are hereby abolished, and elections shall be held only at Pleasant Hill, Kulli Tuklo and Bokchito precincts.

Sec. 12. Be it further enacted. That in Towson county hereafter elections shall be held only at Doakesville and Fowlerville precincts.

Sec. 13. Be it further enacted, That in the Third District in Jack Fork county, Caney, Antlers and Chikasha precincts are hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall be held only at Cove, Many Springs and Sardis precincts.

Sec. 14. Be it further enacted, That in Jackson county, elections shall be held only at Pigeon Roost, Etakshish and Tiak Heli precincts.

Sec. 15. Be it further enacted, That in Atoka county the precincts heretofore known as Big Spring, Black Jack, Round Lake and Medicine Spring are hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall be held only at Atoka, Red Oak and Kiowa precincts.

Sec. 16. Be it further enacted, That in Blue county the precincts known as Jones and Bryantville are hereby abolished. And that hereafter elections shall be held only at Caddo, Boggy Depot and Durant precincts.

Sec. 17. Be it further enacted, That in Kiamitia county elections shall be held only at Good Land, Godwater and Sugar Creek precincts, and all other precincts in the county are hereby abolished.
