## BILL NO.7.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE PRINCIPAL CHIEF TO APPOINT A SPECIAL DELEGATE TO WASHINGTON, D.C., TO ASSIST AND ACT IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE REGULAR DELEGATE IN REPRESENTING THE INTERESTS OF THE CHOCTAW TRIBE OF INDIANS BEFORE THE DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR AND THE COMMITTEES OF CONGRESS.

WHEREAS, The advent of statehood in this country will affect the affairs of the Five Civilized Tribes and force an early if not immediate settlement of all tribal interests; and

WHEREAS, The Choctaw tribe of Indians has many interests of importance yet unsettled, notably the disposition of the coal and asphalt lands and deposits, the allotment or other disposition of the pine timber lands now temporarily withdrawn from allotment, the final disposition of the unallotted lands, etc., and,

WHEREAS, The Choctaw Nation or tribe of Indians desires to be represented in the final disposition of their affairs by a delegation of their best and most representative citizens; there efore.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE CHOCTAW NATION AS-SEMBLED:

Section 1. That the Principal Chief be and he hereby is authorized to appoint some competent person as special delegate to Washington, D.C., whose duty it shall be to assist the regular delegate appointed under and by virtue of an act of the council of October 19,1899, and approved by the President of the United States December 22,1899, entitled "An Act creating the office of Delegate to attend the City of Washington, D.C., and prescribing his duties". Said special delegate to be appointed hereunder shall be charged with all the duties and requirements prescribed by the said act of the council of October 19,1899, and approved by the President, as aforesaid, relating to said regular delegate.

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Section 3. That the term of office of such special delegate shall be for one year. That the sum of five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated out of the funds of the Choctaw Nation, and shall be paid as provided in section 11 of the Act of Congress approved April 26,1906, entitled "An Act to provide for the final disposition of the affairs of the Five Civilized Tribes, and for other purposes".

That this act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval.
