George Wright of Muskogee has received a decision from the department of justice which holds that in the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations the heirs of a deceased allottee have the right to sell the homestead of the deceased. This is a question that has caused a good deal of trouble in these two nations. Many held that the restrictions not being removed from the heirs, they could not sell the land. A great deal of land has been sold on the theory that the heirs had the right to sell. According to the decision these sales are valid and the title is good. The average homestead in these nations is 160 acres.
