MEMORANDUM OF ARGUMENT FOR NATIONS.

Applicants filed their petition before the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes, alleging that Ned Folsom, a white man, married a full blood Choctaw woman by whom he became the father of a daughter named Rebecca Folsom who married a man named David Mitchell by whom she had two sons, John and Andrew. John Mitchell and his descendants are the applicants here.

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Perry is followed by Rachel Colbert who also knew about

the same facts as Perry, but who knew the Mitchell family in Cotton Gin County, Mississippi. This county has entirely disappeared from the map, but this discrepancy is rendered harmless by Andrew J. Mitchell, who immediately followed her, and who snatched the family back to Pontotoc County and locates it securely "near the town of Pontotoc".

The claims of geography, however, are to receive no consideration in this case for Tom York, who was born in Leake County, Mississippi, in 1822, testified to the birth of Rebecca Folsom in 1800; that he got acquainted with her and her husband in 1830, but did not get acquainted with their son until 1845, when they met in Pontotoc County, some six or seven counties north of where York lived; he also fixes the residence of David and Rebecca Mitchell as early as 1830 in Pontotoc County, Mississippi.

The testimony of Tennessee Gardner is instructive only as to the methods of examination which prevailed before the Committee of Council which passed on these cases.

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This is the first time the witness ever told of this trip to Mississippi although he has twice before testified in regard to the matter.

The testimony of this same witness was taken in the Hiram Lancaster case and has been introduced by the Nations for the purposes of impeachment in this case. It seems that his knowledge of the Lancaster family, which has been shown to have no foundation in fact, was obtained on one of these flying trips to Mississippi.

More than that, this witness acknowledges, in his testimony before one of the Judges of this Court, to have signed two affidavits, differing materially from his present testimony, which he says he signed and swore to knowing them to be untrue and that it was his universal custom to make any kind of an affidavit he was asked to make.

We protest this this man's evidence is wholly unworthy of belief and that his confessed contempt for his oath is sufficient of itself to cast doubt on any case in which he appears as a witness.

This record, aside from the testimony of J. C. Folsom, fails to prove applicants' claim, but his evidence conclusively excludes them from the family to which they seek to attach themselves. Had they been really related to the well known Folsom family they would not have waited until they were attempting to prove their citizenship claim to establish the relationship and would not have considered it necessary to offer to pay J. C. Folsom for his assistance.

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

My name is S.P. Perry. I am eighty five years old; my post office in Wiley. I was born in N.C. and when about ten year old was taken by the Indians into the Choctaw Indians settlement in Miss., and resided there until I finally came to the present Choctaw N. Iwas owned by Jimsom Perry, who was a Choctaw Indian by blood. I camen to this country with the second emigration of the Choctaw Indians to look at the countray, and then returned to Miss., and after -wards, about 1842, finally moved to this country and the Choctaw and Chickasaw N. have been my home ever since. I am personally acquainted with the applicant, John Mitchell. I have known him all his life. He is the son of David and Rebecca Mitchell. Rebecca Mitchell was a Miss. Folsom, when she married David Mitchell. Rebecca Mitchell, nee Folsom, was a half blood choctaw Indian, and lived with the Choctaw Indians in the old Choctaw N. in Miss., and was always recognized as a member of that tribe of Indians. After David Mitchell married Rebecca Folsom, he lived with her there in the old Choctaw N. The applicant is a child of them and was about four years old when I finally Teft Miss., and came to this country I left them there in Miss. in Pontatoc Co. Afterwards I met John Mitchell here, in what is known as the Chickasaw District of Choctaw Nation in 1857, and I positively know him to be the same John Mitchell I have been personally acquainted with him all this time. He is now about Sixty years old, His looks show that he is at least it 1/4 Choctaw Indian by blood. I know that he is a bona fide resident of the Choctaw N., and have been for several years. David Mitchell was a white man. I know the father and mother of Rebecca Folsom. Her mother was a full blood Choctaw and they resided there in the Choctaw Country. I saw the m frequently, and lived near them and can not possibly be mistaken about their being Choctaw Indians, and were recognized as such. I am not acquainted with the other applicant, Andrew Mitchell. I dont think he was born when I left

Miss I have no interest in this case except **inxx** as a friend of John Mite ell, having known him all his life and knowing that he is entitled to citizenship. While I am eighty five years old I remember those things distinctly, and am able to ride horseback and eat three meals a day. I live 8 miles from where this deposition is being taken and came here horseback.

I have not been paid anything to come and give this deposition.

My name is Green W. Taylor. I am sixty one years old. L live at Stringtown Ind. Ter. I am a citizen of the United States. I have been living in and around Stringtown about eleven years. I knew Joh Mitchel and Andrew J. Mitchel his brother. Andrew J. Mitchel is blind and has been since he was a child. Andrew J. is about fifty four year old. John Mitchel is about a year younger than I am, which would make sixty years old John Mitchel had a brother , Andrew and sisty Nancy and Rebecca. who were younger a than himself. I knew John Mitchel's mother, and father in Mississippi. They lived in Pantoac County, Choctaw Nation Mis issippi. John Mitchel's father's name was David Mitchel. we was a white man. His mother's name was She was a Miss. Fulsom before marriage. She was a daughter Rebecca of Ned. Fulsom and Rebecca Fulsom one of which was full blood Choctaw Indian to the best of my recollection. I am not sure whether it was Ned or his wife who was a full blood -Choctaw , but I am under the impression it was Ned's wife. I was too young to recollect much about it. I remember Rebyecca the daughter of Ned Fulsom and she is the mother of John Mitchel, and Andrew J. Mitchel. Rebecca Mitcha was recognized as a half breed Indian in the old Choctaw Nation in Mississippt. She married a man by the name of David Mitchel, who was a white man in Mississippt. She talked in the Choctaw language or English. I know this because John and I used to get her to talk Choctaw for us. I lived near John Mitchel8s parents for about nine years, and John and I would visit each frequently. We spent many nights together. John Mitchel and I left Mississippt in 1856. I came to Texas and John came to the Territory. T lived in Texas xh about four years, and then moved to Pike County, Arkansas. I was in Arkansas about a year when I again met John Mithhel. We both resided in Pike County until we jouned the Federal Army at Little Rock in about 1863. We both enlisted in Co. A, 4th Arkansas Cavalry, Fishback regiment, and were soldiers together in the Co. for about

six months. This regiment was disbanded and I joined Co . J of x same regiment for three years. Mitchel was taken sick and went to Little Rock where he remained sick until the close of War. We had We had our main headquarters at Littel Rock, and I would see Mitchel frequently by means of posses. After the close of the war we both moved to Pike County Arkansas, where I lived several years, and then I moved to Texas, and lived about two years, and then I went back to same place in Arkansas, where I saw Mitchel again. I then went to Texas again, remained a while and came to the Territory where I have remined ever since. About seven or eight years agao I again met Mitchel at Stringtown in the Indian Territory, and have seen him frequently since. He has lived here for the past seven or eight years. John Mitchel is about a quarter Indian, his mother being half breeD. John Mitchel arried a woman by the name of Mosy L. Campbell They have about eight childred. Their names are LuElla, who is married to John Puburn, Emma who married Thomas Welch, Alfred H., who married Cyntha Walston, John W., Wm. Joseph, Robt. H/, Dosia O. Myrtle Lee, I am not related to either part to this suit, and have no interest in it.

About five years ago my mother went to Tuskahoma as a witness in some citizenship cases In what cases I do not know My mother was bred and born in the old Choctaw Nation in Mississippi, and has lived the e, and been with the Indians all of her life. I Don't know how old my mother is, but she claims to be a hundred years old or older. My mother had five children that were older than myself; one sister and one brother were about twenty two or three. My mother lived with me nearly always in my recollection. I helped to burry my mother . iI have no interest in this case.

My mother is a daughter of Ned. Fulsom, and Rebecca Fulsom. My mother a half breed Choctaw. My grandmarents liv -ed in the old Choctaw Nation in Mississippi. My mother was born in the old Choctaw Nation in Mississippt, and was recognized by the Choctaw Nation as being Choctaw by blood. She talked Choctaw. My mother married a white man by the name of David Mitchel in Missisppi. I havve one brother whose name is Andrew J. who is blind since a child, and two sisters Nancy and Rebecca. I lived in the Choctaw Nation in Mississippi until I was ninteen years old. I left Mississippi at about nineteen and went to Pike County Arkansas where I remained a while. I then came to the Indian Ter., stayed here a short time and then went back to Pike Co., Ark. where I remained until about 1863, when I joined the Federal Army, Co. A, 4th Ark. Col. Fishback's regiment. I served in that Co. about six months, when it disbanded, and I was taken sick, & went to Little Rock, and remained there until peach was made, then went back to Pike County, Ark. where I remained until about eight years ago, when I came to the Territory, where I have lived since. I married Mary L. Campbell, about 1860 and have eight childredn whose names are LuElla, who married John Pyburn, Emma J., who married Thomas Welck, Alphred H. Who married Cynthy Waaston, John W., Wm. T., Robt. H., Dosia A., Myrtle E. All living and residents of the Choetaw Nation. LeElla, who married John n Pyburn has Bour children, to-wit: Milton H., Benj. H., James B. Mary L.. Emma J ., who married Thomas Welch has five children to-wit: Adella B., John M., Christinia P. Milton, Dosia A., Alphred H. married Cynty Walston, and by her has one do ild whose name is Ollie. The other children live

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with me. About 1892 I applied to the Choctaw Council for citizekkip and paid my hundred dollars, as required by law, and my case remains as unfinished business, but the Citizen Committee reports favorable Green in my case. I have known XXXXXXX W. Taylor from boyhood. We served in the Army together. I livednear him in Pike Co. Ark. for several years. I have known Green W. Taylor in the Territory for seven or eight years. Green W. Taylor who testified in this case is the same man I have known from boyhood, and with bhom I served inthe Federal Army. I and my brother Andrew, who is fifty four years old are one fourth Choctaw, and my children are one eighth Choctaw. My brother Andrew J. has lived in the Territory for the past two years. Between thirty & forty years ago I met S.P Perry i nthe Ind. Ter.

I know the applicant John Mitchell and knew him in Mississippi / I also know his brother Andy Mitchell in Mississippi, he was a blind man. They are both Choctaw Indians, one fourth, and were go recognized in Mississippi by the Choctaw Indians among whom they lived. I knew the mother of John and Andy Mitchell. Her husband was a white man who lived there in Mississippi among the Indians. She was recognized ad a Choctaw by the Choctaw and spoke their language. She married David Mitchell who was a white man, her name was Rebecca Fulson before she was married to David Mitchell. Rebecca Mitchells mother was a full blood Choctaw. She lived there among the Choctaws and was recognized by them as being one of them. She spoke the Choctaw XXXXXX language. Mitchells looks and general appearance show that he is a Choctaw. 16th .-- In the John Mitchell case, under date of July. 1897. witness testifies: Am 85 years old. Born in North Carolina. When about ten years old came with the Indians to the Choctaw settlement in Mississippi. Resided there until I finally came present to the Choctaw Nation. I was owned by Jimson Perry, and was a Choctaw Indian by blood. Came to this country with the second emigration to look at the country and then returned to Mississippi and finally moved to the Indian Territory in about 1842. Have lived here ever since. Am personally acquainted with the applicant, John Mitchell. I have known him all his life. He is the son of David and Rebecca Mitchell. Rebecca was a Miss Folsom, when she married David Mitchell. She was a half blood Choctaw and lived with the Choctaw Indians in the old Choctaw Nation in Mississippi. The applicant is a child of David and Rebecca Mitchell. Was about four years old when I left Miss.

and came to this country. I left him in Pontotoc County, Miss. Afterwards I met John Mitchell here in 1857, and positively know him to be the same John Mitchell and have been personally acquainted with him all this time. He is now about sixty years old. I have made a further investigation of this matter and find that Wade G. Mitchell is also known as John W. Mitchell and it may possibly be that he is included in the case of William C. Mitchell et al. vs the Choctaw Nation under that name. We are very anxious to take this matter up with you as our client desires to file upon a piece of Mitchell's land in case we can have his case disposed of denying him citizenship.

We also have a like case against William D. Cunningham which I wish you would look up and see what his status is. The parties that have employed us to look after these matters claim that they have testimony which will knock these parties out and it may be that the testimony which they claim they are able to produce is some which your office has not come in touch with as yet.

Is and myself are glad to hear that you are doing well and hope to see you in Tishomingo before long and are mighty glad to note that you propose coming to Tishomingo via Denison and would suggest that this is the last week in which Finn Brothers can be of any assistance to you and, therefore, try and make your trip within the specified time.

SYNOPSIS OF THE JOHN MITCHELL, ET AL/ CASE.

Applicants state that they are the sons of David Mitchell and Rebecca Mitchell (nee Folsom); that Rebbecca Folsom was the daughter of Ned Folsom and a full blood Choatw Indian woman. Wherefore applicants state they are 1/4 Choctaw Indian by blood.

Applicants rejected by Dawes Commission. Appealed to the United States Court for the Central Distirct. Papers do not show with what result.

AFFIDAVITS BEFORE DAWES COMMISSION.

Samuel Perry, of Wiley, Indian Territory says that John Mitchell is the son of David and Rebecca Mitchell (nee Folsom) who lived in Pontotoc County, **Mixxaix** Mississippi about the year 1850. Says that Rebecca Mitchell was an Indian and David Mitchell was a white man. Affiant knew applicants grand parents and knew that his grand mother on his mothers side was a full blood Choatw Indian.

Racheal Colbert's affidavit same as above, except that she known applicants parents in cotton gin County in the old Nation in Mississippi.

Andrew J. Mitchell, one of the applicants states that he lived mear Jeffs, I. T. for about one year. That prior to that time he lived in Pontotoc County, Mississippi. Remainder of affidavit same as applicatin

Tom York, of Simpsom, I.T., says that he is a full blood Choctaw, and a citizen of the Choctaw Nation. He has known applicant since the year 1845. Remainder of affidavit same as Samuel Perry's.

John Mitchell, of Jeffs, I.T., has limed in the Choctaw and Chickasaw Nations for the past six years. Prior to that he lived in Miss. and Ark. Remainder of affidavit same as application.

Green W.taylor has known the applicant since 1844; knew him in Pontotoc County in Miss. Remainder same as above.

J.J.Gardner says that the Citizenship Committee of the Choctaw Council reported favorably on the application of John Mitchell for admission in 1892, but the Council rejected it.

DEPOSITIONS.

S. P. Perry says that k he knew John Mitchell in Mississippi That john Mitchell was about four years old when Perry left Mississippi. When affiant met Mitchell here a few years ago, affiant knew him and recognized x him. Deposition states same things as affidavit in other respects.



Recbecca Mitchell was recognized as a half brees Indian in the old Choctaw Nation Lived near John Mitchells parents for about nine years. In view of the fact that a field investigation has heretofore been made which substantially disposes of the case we will not take up the case in detail but merely refer to the records of the United States Government as applied to the claim of the applicants.

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It does not appear from an examination of said records that there ever was a Choctaw Indian of the name of NNedDolean Folsom residing in the state of Mississippi. The records do show that there was a "white man" of the name of Nathaniel Folsom who was the father of Colonal David Folsom (page 70 vol. 7 American state Papers) and in another place (page 7 of said book) showSthat Colonal David Folsom was a^Nhalfbreed Choctaw"; this would therefore show that the wife of Nathaniel Folsom was a full blood Choctaw.

There are numerous persons of the name of Folssom referred to in the records of the government but it is not possible to identify them as to the relationship ther bore towards each other.

The witness D. D.
