That under Act of Congress of June 10th, 1896, appellants applied the pawes Indian Commission and asked to be admitted as citizens, submitted their proof in support of same, and on the third day of December, 1896, said Commission, contrary to law and the evidence denied appellants petition.

IV.

That said Dawes Commission erred in refusing to admit appellant FIRST, - Because the evidence made a prima facia wase in favor of appellants.

SECOND. There being no answer filed by the Choctaw Nation, appellants were entitled to be enrolled as by default.

THIRD. In considering defendants answer, in the Cttoctaw Nation answered at all, which was not verified, as the law and

the rules of the Commis ion required nor was same filed within the time required by law.

FOURTH. That the decision of the Dawes Commission was contrary to the law and the evidence.

When I first knew Thomas Farmer he was living with his family in the Choctaw Nation, his wife was called Tempie, she was a white woman, and is now living in the Choctaw Nation. I don't know what her name was before she was married. Rhoda Gaut was one of the appellants herein is a daughter of Thomas and Tem pie Farmer: she married a man by the name of Gaut, who was not an Indian but was a white man; he is now living. Mr. and Mrs. Gaut is living. in the Choctaw Nation, and has three children, I don't know their names I always understood from the Nails, who are Choctaws that Thomas Farmer came from Mississippi to this country some time before the war. Thomas and Tempie Farmer were married in Mississippi, Tempie was a white woman. Rhoda, I think was born in the Indian Territory, she has lived here all her life; some years ago she married a white man by the name of Richard Gaut, with whom she is now living in the Choctaw Nation, and by whom she has several children. I have lived among the Indians all my life, was born in N.C. and when quite a small boy went to Miss. and came to this country with the sec-

ond immigration of the Choctaws. I knew Quilla Farmer Presilla or Polly Nial. They were married when I knew them, they were both Choca taw Indians, certainly half blood, possibly more. They were the pare nts of Thomas Farmer, who married a white woman they called Tempie They had a large family every member of whom I knew well. Rhoda Gaut is their daughter, she was born in Miss. came to this country and married a man by the hame of Richard Gaut, who is now living. they have children, I dont know how many or what their names are. Polly Hill is also a daughter of Thomas and Tempie Farmer, several years ago she married a white man by the name of Tom Hill; they also have several children, but I do not know their names. 
